CRITERION I - CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 Institution has the mechanism for well-planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Our institution follows the curriculum approved by Punjabi University, Patiala. The syllabus for each semester is completed in such a way that students attain theoretical as well as practical application of the subject matter. To facilitate well planned curriculum delivery throughout the semester unitization of syllabus is done by all faculty members in each department of study. Each topic in a unit is allotted appropriate teaching learning hours as per the difficulty level of the topic. Students are given list of reading materials along with lectures delivered as per the allotted time table of the week. Lectures delivered are supported by PowerPoint presentation wherever facility is available. Various units of curriculum are supplemented through field visits, paper reading, assignments, seminar, workshops, chart-making, group discussions etc.. Experts in the field of study are invited for guest lectures in various departments.

Regular monitoring of learning outcomes is done through quiz and tests. Monthly tests and mid-semester tests are taken to evaluate students. Assignments are regularly given to students to cover various units of subject matter. Brain storming activities are done to involve students in critical thinking about subject matter.

Environment education, drug abuse and prevention education is also taught to all students to prepare them to be responsible students of the nation. Each department encourages students to join NCC and NSS program where students attend extension activities. Small projects and fields survey given to students to understand the concepts through practical application. Well-equipped laboratories are present in the institution where students may perform practical as per the curriculum requirements. Regular purchase of new equipment for laboratories ensures up to date laboratories in the institution. Some departments have computer facilities for students. The computer library has computer and internet facility for students. The well-equipped library offers reference sections and subject sections for all subjects. Students are allowed to issue books from the library as well as use the reading room.

Our college obtains the feedback from different stake holders. Students, teachers, alumni and parents participate by offering suggestion and recommendations for the overall progress of the institution. Students are encouraged to give feedback about infrastructure, academics, faculty and other areas according to their needs. The student feedback is seriously considered by the college principal and special efforts are made to work in a way to fulfil the needs of students. They may also use the suggestion box to leave their feedback or complaints anonymously students may give feedback to their allotted tutors during tutorial group meetings. Feedback is also taken from faculty members to help in the formulation of academic calendar, improvement of departmental working, infrastructure and student-teacher relationship. Faculty members may address their feedback to the principal directly, to the college council or staff secretary. The college council and principal together asses the feedback and chalk out the plan of action for better academic planning and devise pedagogical strategies based on the experience of faculty members. The meeting of staff council further deliberates upon the decisions taken to fulfill suggestions in the feedback. 2.3.2 Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Our college adopts an effective mentoring system that provides academic and personal guidance to the students. Students studying in various academic programs are allotted tutorial groups. Each tutorial group is assigned a tutor. This tutor is available to the group members throughout the academic session. Periodic tutorial group meetings are helpful for students in college during college hours. Students are encouraged to attend these meetings regularly. Tutors try to maintain a close rapport with the students for the purpose of mentoring them.

Students can bring their problems to their respective tutor and receive guidance and help. Along with academic guidance the mentoring program offers personal counseling to the students. Qualified guidance counselors are easily accessible to the students through appointments.

The Red Ribbon Club and NSS unit has volunteers who help to mentor fellow students and spread awareness about drug de-addiction, blood donation, environment protection, etc.

The Career Placement Cell offers support to students and mentor them regarding preparation for job interviews, resume writing, etc.

The physical education department mentors talented sports students and helps them prepare for various sports competitions at district, state, national and international level.

The cultural committee of the college offers continuous mentoring to talented students and prepares them for music, dance, theatre, fine arts and various literary events.

Policies for maintaining and utilizing Physical Academic and support facilities- laboratory, library, sports, complex, computers, classrooms etc. are important aspect of development of our institution.

The overall development of our campus mainly the college building is undertaken by the PWD Punjab. On the need basis. Expert engineers and Junior Engineer regularly visit the college to inspect the buildings and plan maintenance activities. The said maintenance including the repairs and renovations is funded by the college through central grants like RUSA, state government grants from Parent Teacher Association (PTA) funds. Rough estimates are invited from the PWD and work is only allotted to government agencies.

The sports grounds, green areas and parks of the college are well maintained on the yearly basis, seasonal maintenance especially during the monsoon season is undertaken by the Municipal Co-operation (MC). The technical staff of the horticultural department regularly visits the college and undertakes the required maintenance. Various departments of the college have students volunteers, who have adopted certain green area of the college and they undertake maintenance and beautification of these parks.

The maintenance of the laboratories is the responsibilities of the concerned departments and physical maintenance required is done by the PWD and the maintenance of the equipment may be carried out through the funds of the respective department with some help from the PTA fund.

Any other minor maintenance that is required for the upkeep of the college is done with the help of PTA fund. The college Principal along with the council members and the members of Parent Teacher Association, plan the yearly policy for the maintenance and a resolution passed by them and voted for is considered approved. College enjoys autonomy for carrying out minor maintenance activities.

College prospectus committee, college magazine, student welfare, grievances etc. along with building property committee, electricity water committee etc. work to ensure all around development of college for effective participative management

The college has an excellent system of management. Permanent committees consisting of faculty members are made for the whole session to help in smooth functioning of the college. The convener of each committee is assisted by members who help to carry out the duty according to the needs of the students. Curriculum Development

***** Research and Development

The teachers of the college are encouraged to attend conferences seminars and workshops. Faculty members from different departments are actively involved in writing research papers. The faculty of the college provide their services as resource persons, subject expert. Duty leaves are provided for this. To inculcate the spirit of research among the students different projects and assignments are given to them.

❖ Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

The library is updated with university reference books, recent journals and magazines. The college library has access to N-Lists data. The ICT facilities sufficiently available in the college for better academic performance.

***** Human Resource Management

To increase the skills of the teachers the college organizes conferences, seminars, workshops and extension lectures.

Industry Interaction / Collaboration

The college has experts from corporates, industries, banks to deliver extension lectures to the students. Placements, career and counseling cell of the college organizes industrial training, workshop and youth development workshops. Students were sent different hotels (like Taj, Mount View, JW Marriot etc.) for industrial training for the period of six months.
